Re-purposing the FLOUR MILL

Chris Payne was the guest speaker at the September Community Dinner. He started by telling us all about his journey – firstly with buying and restoring his house, then the flour mill. He said it has been a huge labour of love – something he wanted to do to give back to the community. Some of the issues he has had to deal with – apart from those normally associated with restoring a burnt out, derelict building – has been with council where the building inspector wanted to impose modern building design and specifications on something that was built in the late 1800's – to Chris' mind this would have perverted the history of the building. He wanted to see the building restored as a reflection on how people thought when it was built.

He anticipates that it will be officially opened during November, and although there are a couple of tenants lined up, he is still looking for more. He'd like a mix of tenants and envisions perhaps some artisans would find it a good fit.

+ Did you know?

The Flour mill was built in 1862.

In the mid 1860's a second pair of millstones was installed.

By 1866 a blood & bone crushing mill, a bark mill, a lime room, creamery & butter & cheese factory had been added.

In 1900 the mill was modernised and was producing 3,500 bags per annum.

It was operational until it was burnt out in 1923, with the tall chimney being demolished in 1951, as it had become unsafe.

Uncovering Mt Pleasant's past: Coaches & Courage

The Register (Adelaide, SA : 1901 - 1929) Friday 11 August 1916 p 9 Article

A TIMELY HALT.

CHAIN OF PONDS, August 9.-The few passengers and driver who happened to be journeying on the mail coach between Adelaide and Mount Pleasant had a fortunate escape here this morning. The driver found that the brake was not working properly, and alighted to make an examination. It was discovered that the king bolt of the undercarriage had broken in halves and had allowed it to slip forward. The breakage was found at a most opportune time, for had the coach gone far on Red Hill serious results would have probably followed. After a delay of two hours, during which period the local blacksmith made a new bolt, the coach was able to proceed on its journey.

MOUNT PLEASANT, August - A large number of residents met to bid God-speed to Signaller Leslie Harding last evening. Mr. F. Dewell occupied the chair. Speeches were delivered by Messrs. C. A. Bax, A. C. Follett, and J. Tamblvn and the Rev. F. W. Wilkinson. Items were contributed by Misses M. Tamblvn, G. Speed, M. Adamson, and J. Bax and Mr. Perry, and a comedietta, "A Lamé Dog," by Misses D. Northridge, E. Kemp, F. Langford, and J. Talbot. Gifts were presented to the guest, including new Testament from the teachers and scholars of the Presbyterian Sunday School, a prayer-book by the Rev. F. W. Wilkinson,, and a pipe and tobacco from the young people's intelligence committee. Supper and a dance followed.

Helping people who are blind or vision impaired has always been the mission of the Royal Society for the Blind (RSB), but what about those who have seen 'too much'? Operation K9 Assistance Dog Program is for veterans living with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

Operation K9, a joint program provided by the RSB and the Returned & Services League (RSL-SA), is part of the RSB's Assistance Dog program.

The RSB Assistance Dogs involved in Operation K9 may accompany their owners everywhere, including public transport, shopping centres, cinemas and restaurants, and are trained to carry out a range of tasks aimed at reducing anxiety, as well as being a 'friend' and companion to those living with PTSD.

"To see the special relationship between veterans in need and their RSB Assistance Dog is a beautiful thing."

The Mount Pleasant RSL will be hosting members of the Royal Society for the Blind (RSB) who will be explaining how they train dogs for operation K9 and the special tasks they need to carry out for those with PTSD. Anyone interested in seeing this special relationship between dog and veteran are welcome. Come along and hear how assistance dogs are making a huge difference to our returning veterans and their families.

A puppy educator will be in attendance to talk to us about what's involved.

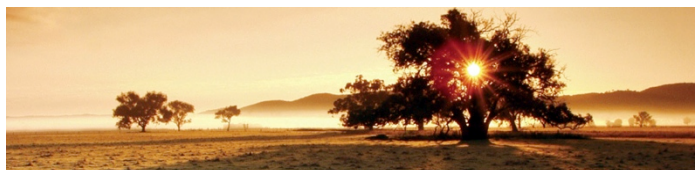
South Australia's state winner will represent SA against the other state and territory winners in the national award later in 2017.
