



2017 – a look back

Whilst globally, 2017 might not be a year to remember fondly, we haven't fared too badly.

We were still suffering the hangover from the blackouts in January, and Elon Musk's offer of constructing the battery array was yet to come, but the Australia Day breakfast was a high point. This year the CWA was awarded 'Group of the Year' and Paula Bartsch, Merry Schaeffer and Di Anderson were each given 'Citizen of the Year' Awards. Sadly, there were no Junior nominations, but we are hoping that will be rectified at the next AD breakfast. Roger Benton was named RSL SA Affiliate of the Year, and even though there have been major dramas with the state bodies, our group remains active and strong. The Market turned 5! A great achievement – and it continues to set the benchmark for other markets around Australia. In March - once again the Show proved why it is considered the best South Australian Country Show, and we had great weather for it. The Barossa Council invited interested parties to come together under the Big Project umbrella to decide what would be the most effective. It was decided that upgrading the Caravan Park should be a priority, and although we have seen some plans, this has yet to be realised. The Market hosted a Taste Australia event which was booked out and highlighted once again how lucky we are with the range and quality of local produce we have access to. The Easter Twilight Market continued with locals taking advantage of buying before the break. April also saw a meeting to decide the fate of the Street Party – and as we discovered – there were plenty of people willing to put their money where their mouths were and make sure this year's event would be successful. The Anzac Dawn Service and Gunfire Breakfast was again well attended, and the flags were finally in place! In May History Month included a Mystery History Tour hosted by Paula. It was so successful that we had to include several cars as well as the bus to hold everyone. The tour included a talk from Grace Kroehn at the Friedensberg School Museum, lunch at Glen Roy Homestead, finishing at Rosebank. Paula is making plans for another tour this year, so get in early! The Barossa Council put forward suggestions for a new Waste System – and it seems we will be maintaining the status quo – for the time being. A 'Dark Sky Reserve' project was launched at Meldanda – and the Ladies of the Night had a theme of 'Christmas in June' for the Community Dinner. TOTT produced the very funny 'Three Bags Full' which had rave reviews and some of the cast attended the dinner, which confused and entertained us. The latest productions from TOTT have been very well attended in Mount Pleasant and it's great to see this local group still providing us with fantastic entertainment. TOTT was on hand to help celebrate our Hall's 90th birthday, when the Community Dinner was held after the Violet Day High Tea. Paula had organised the Band of the SA Police – Wind and Brass Quintets to play for us during the High Tea, and we enjoyed them so much we have asked that they play at another event in 2018 (more to come later). The Community Dinner on that night was a 90th birthday party for the hall. It was a resounding success and the show that TOTT put on (at very short notice) was a huge hit with the audience, who sang and clapped along with music through the ages.

In August we held our first Pop Up Op Shop and Springton hosted a Beatles Pop Up Supper Club with Allan Pearce - which was packed out. We are hoping they hold another one! Springton also played host once again to a SALA event - with a fantastic display that highlighted just how many talented artists live in our district. There was another extremely well attended Fleece & Fibre Fair, and the Tapscotts hosted the annual Weekend of Dance.

September started with a bang when the CFS held another hugely successful Comedy Night - a great turnout showcasing some local, and not so local comedians. The following weekend we had a Quiz night - which was great fun and raised funds for community projects - we have already penciled in another one for 2018. The second Spring Garden Festival was held on a day that started out beautifully, but was hampered slightly by strong winds later in the day. However - the crowds were double what we had last year, which was amazing. October saw the first Show and Shine fundraising rally at Talunga Park, we had a Pantomime at Williamstown, Springton held their annual Spring Fair, the Friends had an Open Garden at Birdwood, and the pubs continued with hosting some great Live Music. The Men's Shed also hosted another great 'Spanner in the Works?' men's health day, which was attended by the President of the Irish Men's Shed and also the CEO of the Australian Men's Shed Association. Australia Day - 1916

21 July 1916 Mt Barker Courier MT. PLEASANT NEWS

There was a very large attendance at the local Agricultural Hall on Saturday evening last, when the Australia Day Celebration was held. Mr. Geo. Melrose (president of the committee) in a very appropriate speech declared the fair open punctually at 8 o'clock p.m., and from that time on good business was done at the various stalls. The secretary (Mr. J. Tamblyn) told our representative that after all expenses had been paid over £100 would be added to the Wounded Soldiers' Fund, which, considering the stress of the times, is very good indeed. The following musical programme was carried out: National Anthem; overture - Blumberg Brass Band, Song - Miss B. Promnitz, comic song - Mr. A. J. Harvey, cornet trio, Messrs. Schaedel, Sheperdson, and Rescke, song - Miss Speed, band selection, song - Miss Fewster, band selection. Following were the stalls and stallholders - sweets, Mrs. J. Neagle and Misses B. South, F. Stibbles, M. Tamblyn and Seeliger; fancy - Mesdames F. Daw, Proctor, and Harding; produce - Mesdames Wellsman and McBean, and Miss Wellsman; refreshments - Mesdames A. Hicks, J. Tamblyn, G. Talbot, Tapscott, and Misses J. Talbot and O. Cooper; bran pie - Mrs. A. C. Follett; fortune teller - Miss Turner. There were also various competitions. A euchre tournament, which was in the capable hands of Messrs. Ben Giles and J. Herriot, was another attraction, and the winners were found in Miss Guthrie and Mr. McGilvray.

On giving

Christmas was always a noisy event in my family, and as most of our extended family was in Adelaide, the Riverland or Mt Gambier, it was usually just us, and always at home, except for one memorable year someone thought it would be a good idea to go to the beach. We only did it once. We've all received those presents where we thought perhaps that the giver didn't really know us very well (I'm thinking of the year I received a desk. Not one of those little things, but a full on, one-piece lift-top jobby.) It was way too big to fit anywhere comfortably, and we all got bruised by knocking into it, but Mum and Dad thought that it would be good for me to draw at, as I'd drawn as long as I could remember, and they were convinced I would grow up to be a great artist. Sadly I've hardly lifted a pencil since having kids and seem to have lost what little talent I had. A good ad for 'If you don't use it, you lose it!' On the whole though, we had fun and Christmas lunch always included my mum's wonderful roast chicken filled with her fabulous apple stuffing.

After the MOTH and I married, we travelled around the state a fair bit, and the kids arrived, but we nearly always managed to get home for Christmas. I remember one Christmas up at Marla when he'd gone to Adelaide for court or something and had called into mum's on the way home and picked up a small pine tree, stuffing in the back of the car to come home. The kids were ecstatic – a little bit of tradition in the 40 degree heat that was Marla in summer.

When we shifted here we only had to go out the road to mum and dad's place, and it was an hour to Don's mum's. Because mum and dad's place had plenty of room, we usually had Christmas there, and on one occasion I remember 'decorating' my sister's face whilst she slept off Christmas lunch, while my other sister spent the day angry at her husband because he'd opened his present from her and immediately said "Not another one! Didn't you give me one of these last year?" One of the games that we played that year was pass the bag and we had to take something out of it and wear it. Don's dad (who was well over six foot and a former British Army Staff Sergeant) was a nurse for the afternoon. Sadly – no pictures.

Making gifts has become more of a priority of late, and also giving and receiving gifts in kind – maybe donating goods to a school, or buying a goat for a village. Over the years we've all put in gifts at the various collection points in malls and shopping centres, and hoped that they made someone's Christmas a little brighter. I was listening to the television news recently and heard that Sir Paul McCartney had donated tickets for his recent tour to be given to the homeless. Apparently there were a couple which were given back at short notice, so the daughter of a Salvos leader and her partner took them when no-one else could be found to take them. Probably not their best move. The question was then asked "Would it not have been better to have given clothing or food to the homeless people?" Why? Should homeless people only have access to the things we deem necessary? Food, shelter, clothing?

What about food for the soul? What about having fun? I remembered this quote I had seen in a twitter feed from Judy Dominick:

'When middle class people pamper themselves, we call it "self care". When the poor do it to ease their suffering, we call it irresponsible.'

And the follow up:

'If we only evaluate things through the lens of fiscal responsibility, we miss what chronic trauma, anxiety and scarcity do to people.'

A gift can come in many forms. Whether it is a hug when you are feeling lonely, a kind word, a meal, some time, listening to someone, or a small handout when payday seems too far away. My former boss gave me the gift of his confidence and trust – and to me that is priceless. He also taught me to have a go and not be afraid – which is why I started this newsletter.

Small kindnesses can mean everything to some people – but you may not see that. Sometimes people have funny ways of showing gratitude – and we don't know why that is. The thing is – we don't have to know. A gift is a gift. Something you give away. It should not have strings (although in Sir Paul's case, the Salvos were acting as intermediaries as there was little chance he would actually come across many homeless people).

As I keep banging on about volunteering, you all know there are many places and organisations in town which would benefit from some extra help – and the great thing is – you would not only be helping them. Try it and see.

Anyway – I hope you all had lovely Christmases and great New Years' celebrations – if that's what you're into. We intend to spend our New Years' at the oval watching the Big Bash, and depending on the traffic, wish each other a Happy New Year as we're driving home. If you need to make resolutions, the advice from the experts is to not wait a year and revise your goals every three months. Probably very wise.

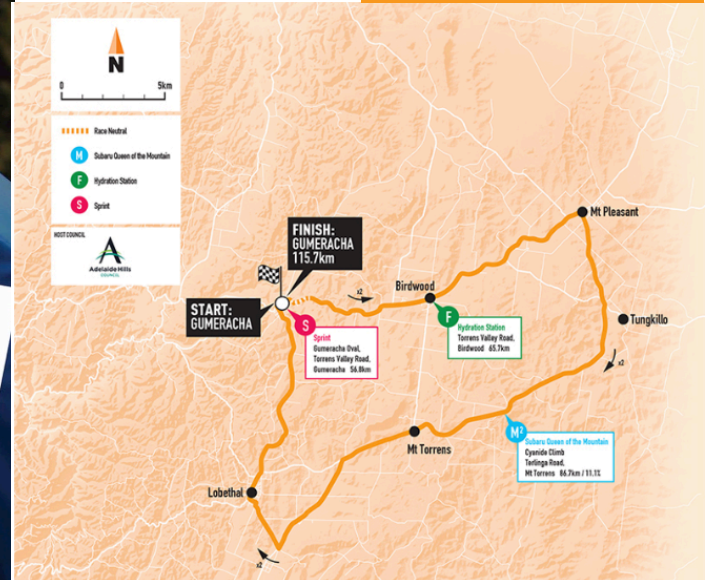
