SAPOL Newsflash:

Police are urging the community to talk to members of their family and wider

community about scams. At times would-be scammers will solicit a person's help by pretending they are from Telstra or other credible organisations such as the Police, Centrelink or the Australian Taxation Office. They will encourage the victim to not discuss the matter with anyone, making it even more important that the community work together to become educated about these scams. Government agencies do NOT seek payments – even when 'urgent' – in iTunes cards. The gift cards are valuable to pay for Apple products, but are not a legitimate way to make payments over the phone for things such as taxes, debts, computer servicing or utility bills. The scammers are very confident on the phone and very persuasive, at times keeping the victim on the phone while they go to buy the iTunes cards. Remember:

- if it looks too good to be true, it probably is
- get independent advice if an offer involves significant money, time or commitment
- always know who you are communicating with and where your information is going
- If you are uncertain, confirm the contact is legitimate through methods other than what they have provided
- never give your personal details, passwords, credit card or online account details to a person you cannot identify in an official capacity
- never give an unsolicited person remote access to your computer. You may compromise the security of your device and your personal information.
- ensure your computer is protected with regularly updated anti-virus and anti-spyware software. More information is available at the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission's Scamwatch website <https://www.scamwatch.gov.au/>

Although none of the Mount Pleasant projects were successful, on a per capita basis we were punching above our weight. The Tennis Courts Upgrade received 89 votes: The Upgrade of the CWA Garden received 85 votes and the Gym proposal received 75 votes. All in all – not too bad. All three were worthy projects and we have high hopes that they will receive funding from other sources.

It came as no surprise that the lion's share – in fact all of the successful proposals – came from the Barossa. A Pedestrian Crossing at Nuriootpa costing \$70,000 attained 240 votes: Community Helpers Warehouse for \$150,000 garnered 207 votes: Coulthard 'The Peoples Place' (youth based project) for \$150,000 received 189 votes and a Revamp of the Barossa Farmers Market amenities block for \$60,000 scored 193 votes.


Next year we are hoping that we will be able to encourage more people in our community to think about voting in this great initiative where the people within the communities get to have a say – rather than local councils.







Quite interesting...

The 'Fund My...' projects that the government has bankrolled the last few years are loosely based on the Participatory Budgeting format first promulgated in Brazil in the 1980s' and have spread to several other countries and have been very successful. Whilst not perfect, it does help communities focus on the things that are important to them, and enables them to receive funding for something they might not otherwise have achieved through 'normal' channels and processes. According to Wikipedia – PB generally involves several basic steps:

1. Community members identify spending priorities and select budget delegates
2. Budget delegates develop specific spending proposals, with help from experts
3. Community members vote on which proposals to fund
4. The city or institution implements the top proposals.

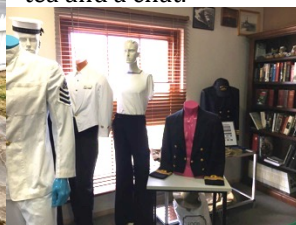

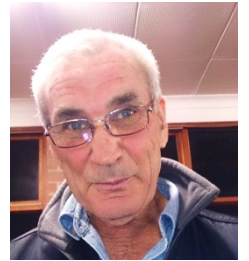
Remembrance Day

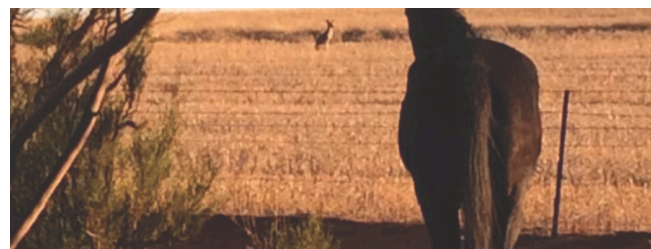
